Dr. Miller is Board Certified in both Psychiatry and Addiction Medicine, with additional certifications in Buprenorphine and Tobacco Treatment. He is a native of Ohio and was awarded United States Air Force (USAF) full scholarships in physics and pre-medicine for undergraduate training, and later a full scholarship for medical school. Dr. Miller earned honors distinctions in undergraduate and graduate education. He then completed residency in psychiatry at Wright Patterson USAF Medical Center/Wright State University in Dayton, Ohio where he ranked in the top 1-2% among all U.S. psychiatry resident physicians-in-training on standardized testing. Selected directly from residency by the Psychiatry Consultant to the USAF Surgeon General to serve at the high visibility Presidential base of Andrews Air Force Base in Washington, DC, he treated a variety of high-profile military and federal officials, as well as rare conditions. Here he served in the Tri-Service Addiction Recovery Center (TriSARC) – the worldwide tertiary referral center for the diagnosis and treatment of addiction related disorders within the Department of Defense (DoD). In short time he was promoted to Chief Administrative and Clinical Officer of TriSARC. As Chief, he was awarded the DoD *Meritorious Service Medal* for vastly overhauling service design, reducing costs, and translating several cutting edge research findings into practice, and earning one of few *USAF Best Practice Awards*. He later was awarded this medal again for similar high level impact to the field.

Hand-picked by the DoD as the Lead Editor/Author for the first-ever *Veterans Affairs-DoD Clinical Practice Guideline for the Management of Substance Use Disorders*, Dr. Miller has been active in a wide range of topics relating to addictions and has authored more than 40 peer-reviewed medical publications, including his own research. He has been interviewed for *Dateline* (NBC), *Pravda*, and *U.S. News & World Report* for his clinical expertise. He Co-Chaired the *American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM) Review Course* and has served as *Co-Editor* and now *Editor-in-Chief* for their flagship text *Principles of Addiction Medicine*; one of the largest, most read addiction textbooks worldwide. Dr. Miller has been selected as a “Distinguished Fellow” of both the American Psychiatric Association and ASAM, and has Co-Chaired ASAM’s prestigious *State of the Art Course in Addiction Medicine*. He has co-authored the *VA-DoD Clinical Practice Guideline for the Management of Opiate Therapy in Chronic Pain*; and has served as *Co-Editor of Journal of Addiction Medicine*, ASAM’s peer-reviewed medical journal, one that he co-founded and then led for its first decade.

Throughout his career, Dr. Miller has maintained medical school faculty appointments and an active clinical practice. Dr. Miller has 20 years direct clinical experience specializing in addictions, including detoxification, rehabilitation, dual-diagnosis, corrections, methadone, buprenorphine, chronic pain, drug testing, impaired providers, and a wide scope of addiction related disorders. He has earned awards in teaching, leadership, research, and clinical excellence; including the *Humanism in Medicine Award* (American Medical Association) and *America’s Top Psychiatrists*. Dr. Miller serves the local medical school as Co-Program Director of the Addiction Psychiatry Fellowship; Associate Director for Education and Training in the Addiction Sciences Division; and also serves as Associate Director for the division. He serves the VA as an attending physician in the detoxification clinic, as well as in a co-existing disorders clinic. He is Program Director for the Addiction Medicine Research Fellowship, and is the Director for the Addiction Division at his local VA Medical Center. Dr. Miller has also served his country as a USAF officer (earning retirement), most recently as a Lieutenant Colonel at the USAF Research Lab.

OOEND is an evidence based approach wherein patients at risk for opioid overdose are educated (and his/her interested others who may be in a future position to rescue them) on (1) risk factors for opioid overdose, (2) how to recognize when an opioid overdose is occurring, (3) how to respond to an overdose, including life-saving actions to take (activate emergency response system/911, give naloxone if available, perform rescue breathing and compressions, monitor until help arrives), (4) how to access support resources (emergency, poison hotline, Veterans Crisis Line, web resources, and CVAMC services for substance use disorders), and (5) the importance of summoning emergency medical services either immediately before or after administering the kit, in accordance with Ohio regulations. This includes training with a resusci-Anne for rescue breathing, and practice administering mock intranasal naloxone, as well as training on how the patient can reduce her/his future risk for overdose if he/she does use opioids. In July of 2014, our approach was identified within VA as a model approach to emulate. We developed the pilot training brochure that is now in national VA use, and continue to provide consultation to the VA nationally, and were the first to incorporate a resusci-Anne. Moreover, the CVAMC was the first to extend this approach via Veterans Justice Outreach to 100% of veterans at risk who are involved in the Veterans Drug Courts -- wherein the judge orders the Veteran to receive the training, and the option to receive an OD kit. CVAMC staff have since provided webinar training to the VA nationally on this evidence-based practice. The CVAMC was among the first to use video-teleconferencing technology to extend the reach of OOEND, and among the very first to extend OOEND to patients without addiction but who are prescribed high dose opioids for chronic pain. The CVAMC was the 3<sup>rd</sup> VA nationally to deploy Naloxone via VA police officers carrying it as first responders. As a result of these combined efforts, the CVAMC has distributed significant numbers of overdose reversal kits and has previously ranked #1 nationally in reported Veteran opioid overdose reversals (lives saved).

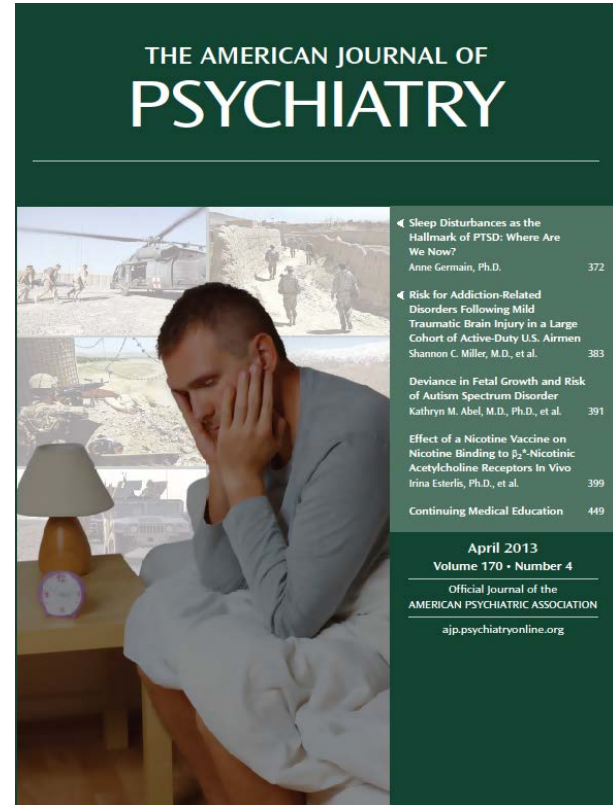

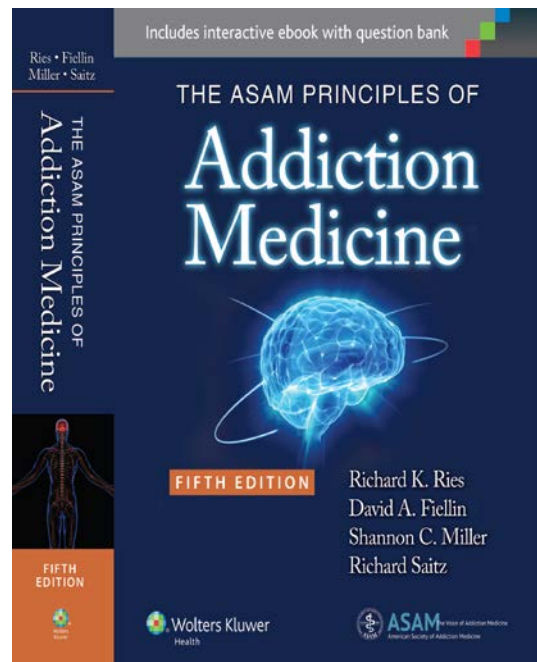

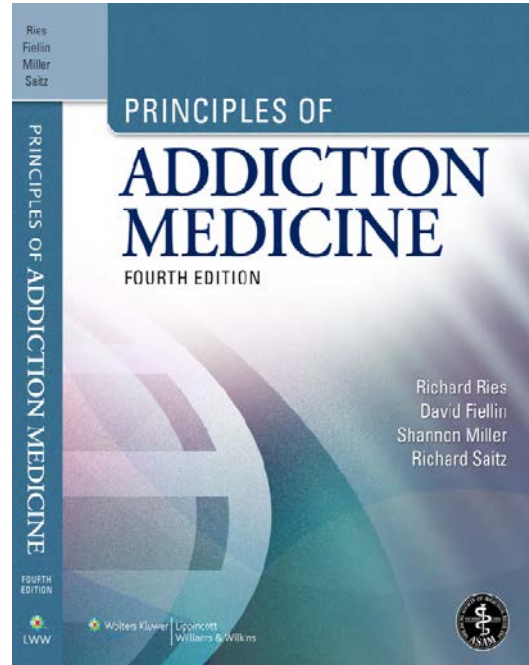
